Sawtry Winemaker's Society held their 47th Annual Show in 2017 at The Old School Hall which was again well supported by the members with large entries in the seventeen classes.

To get you in the mood, try the simple wine recipe opposite.



RIBENA WINE

- ◆ 12oz bottle of Ribena Blackcurrant Juice
- ◆ 3lb Sugar
- ◆ Wine Yeast, Yeast Nutrient and Squeeze of lemon juice
- ◆ Water to fill demijohn



Dissolve sugar in some warm water
Add blackcurrant juice
Bring to boil and simmer for 10 mins to drive off preservative
Cool and pour into gallon demijohn filling it to the shoulder
Add wine yeast and yeast nutrient (available from Wilkinsons in Huntingdon)
Insert air-lock and stand the demijohn in a warm place for fermentation to get under way. When the first fermentation has died down after a fortnight or so, top up the jar with water to the bottom of the neck and re-insert air-lock. When all fermentation has died down rack off and bottle.

SAWTRY HISTORY THEN & NOW

Our ongoing series on stories from Sawtry's past

LINNET (Stanley Rowell)



Every village had their characters that will always be a legend; even today people remember the antics of Linnet.

Born Stanley Rowell in Sawtry Church Street in 1903 to Robert and Mary Rowell, Robert being a Traction Engine Driver, Stanley had a brother and a sister. He got the nickname 'Linnet' from his skill of whistling. His sharp wit and ever-ready tongue got him out of trouble many a time, his badge of office was his Bowler hat, which he wore all the time. He never married and lodged in the old bake-house in The Retreat by the now Chemist Shop.

Linnet used to collect mushrooms from Hunting's field by All Saints Church and then sell them to Hunting's shop. He was known to collect the flowers off the graves and sell them as bouquets to unsuspecting buyers. One particular day the St Ledger was being run at Doncaster races, he went into The Royal Oak pub hoping to get a lift from the farmers meeting there, but they would not take him. Well, being a wily character, off he went up the old A1 hoping to hitch a lift. When the farmers arrived at the course, to their surprise they found Linnet directing traffic into a field for which he was collecting a fee from each one, he had won again!!

He was banned from the 'snug' at The Admiral Wells Pub in Holme by the local farmers. He supported 'The Posh' football team and in 1954 went along to the 3rd round Cup match at which the Lord Mayor of Cardiff attended, supporting his town. Linnet was not going to miss a chance to 'Hob Nob' so after the match he went along to the Queen's Hotel and managed to rub shoulders and have a conversation with the Lord Mayor who later told a reporter that he had met Mr Linnet who was a fascinating man and believed to be one of Peterborough's top journalist.

Later in life, he moved to a bedsit in Cromwell Road Peterborough, where he would sell ice-cream from a special tricycle. He died in February 1969 at the age of 66. His one request was that his coffin was made by Kenneth Rowell (a distant relative) who worked for Mr Turnill the Undertaker and Carpenter of High Street Sawtry.

A true rouge!

AN EYE ON NATURE

I sat where I am now, looking out of my lounge window at the lawn thinking I must get it cut. The daisies and buttercups were in flower and looked beautiful. Every Spring is the same and every year I cut my lawn as soon as it grows. Then a thought came to me, "it is so beautiful as it is, don't cut it this Spring". My experiment then began. One concession was to mow an access path around the edges and to the apple trees.

I waited to see what grew next and a succession of plants came up. I must emphasis, my lawn was not seeded with wild flowers or a variety of grasses, in the years I have been here I have just cut it. The grasses came up and began to flower. It looked beautiful with the seed heads waving in the breeze. My favourite, the Yorkshire fog, appeared in patches amongst other species.

As the longest day came, the grasses set seed and the lawn became a playground for my sparrows as they busily picked off the seeds. Other flowering plants appeared and with the flowers, came the bees and butterflies. The sparrows continued to use the lawn, eating the insects. They spent much of their day there, such a contrast to previous years when the back garden was a wildlife desert.

I waited in anticipation as other flowers came into bloom. Selfheal and ragwort along with one of my favourites, the orange hawkbit. To prevent the spread of ragwort (so dangerous for horses if eaten), I pulled up the plants before they set seed and blew away.

By the end of August, my new meadow had finished and it was time to cut it. I had mimicked the management practice that the Wildlife Trust adopt on their wildflower meadows, which is to mow the grass in August, creating a rich diversity of plants. Unlike my lawn, a wildflower meadow can take hundreds of years to evolve, but with my success in just one year, I will repeat the experiment in 2018.


What I created was a much richer habitat for our wildlife. Insect numbers are plummeting across the country and the knock on effect is worrying. Bees are vital for crop and fruit pollination and butterflies add richness to our gardens. Sparrow chicks need insect food in their first weeks of life and my garden provided all this just by leaving my lawn uncut. If you can spare part of your garden, why not create your own wildlife meadow, believe me it will be worth it.

SAWTRY VILLAGE ACADEMY NEWS

As you may be aware, the former Principal was recently sentenced to 4 years in prison for serious fraud and misconduct in public office. In addition, the behaviours and absence of leadership during a prolonged period means that we are still trying to catch up on years of under investment in building conditions.



Sawtry Village Academy

The planning permission for a replacement £3.5 million teaching block proposed in the rejected 2014/15 Condition Improvement Fund bid is still in place. Cambridge Meridian Academies Trust have pledged to contribute over £1 million of this funding, but we need another £2.5 million from our partners to make this much needed replacement building a reality.

In addition, a further £1.5 million is required to bring the remaining buildings back up to a basic operational standard. Last year, CMAT committed its trust-wide "Schools Condition Allowance" fund to address issues at SVA and the imminent threat of closure made by the fire authority due to non-compliance. In February, we had to close the school due to storm damage.

We now need the help and support of the whole local community to ensure that those who can make a difference act. Our students and staff should not have to continue to suffer shoddy buildings.

FROM CLLR BYWATER

The last couple of months have been very busy with some difficult financial decisions being made at County Council. I would like to clarify how the redefining of children's centres will affect Sawtry and reassure users that Sawtry will not be losing its Children Centre service, as has been suggested by some.

In fact, frontline delivery is increasing across Cambridgeshire with better outreach programs. Sawtry Children Centre Zone will be moving to the Youth and Community Centre in 2018 after it has been redeveloped for the Library relocation and other community users.

In early October I attended Huntingdon Crown Court for the sentencing of the Former Principle and Vice Principle of Sawtry College. On behalf of the Community, I just want to pass on my thanks to all the current staff who provided evidence to secure these convictions. Special thanks must go to the new Principle Sarah Wilson who has turned the school around under extreme pressure. I also want to thank the two Police Officers for their excellent work, which was instrumental in ensuring convictions; their work was also "commended" by the judge. We all now need to look forward and do everything to support the school, to regain its reputation and become a school of which we can be proud. I will be certainly doing all I can but the County Council is no longer responsible for the funding of Academies, as this comes direct from Government. I have ensured a proposal paper, to support Sawtry Village Academy, is being presented to the Children and Young people's Committee in early December. I await the outcome at the time of writing.

On a more positive note I recently attended Sawtry Junior Academy to speak to year 6 pupils about being a County Councillor. It was a really engaging experience for all of us and the pupils asked me some really great questions.

Going into 2018 we will face some significant challenges which I will continue to tackle wholeheartedly on behalf of all residents in the community.

GOING GREEN

Did anyone else see the BBC analysis to what uses we put our beautiful island? It certainly took me by surprise given the huge amount of controversy, both nationally and locally, about the amount of new housing that's going up. I for one, have been living under the misapprehension that the UK was more or less full, mainly covered in buildings apart from bits of the Fens, the Peak District, the Yorkshire Dales and North Scotland!

The survey, done from the air, gave the percentages for four different types of land use, ie 'Built on' (including roads), 'Green urban' (parks, golf courses etc), 'Farmland' and 'Natural' which are fairly self-explanatory. Nationally, the figures show that over half, 57% is currently farmland, 2% green urban and just 6% has been built on, while the remaining 35% is natural. Looking more locally, the picture in Huntingdonshire somewhat differs in that we have much more farmland, that is a staggering 88% but only 4% of our district is classed as natural. However, the other two categories all but match the national picture in that 3% is green urban and much to my surprise, only 6% of Huntingdonshire has been built on. Six percent isn't very much at all, we're lucky to be almost entirely surrounded by green, be that urban green, farmland or natural.

Obviously Scotland is mostly natural, while the farmland is more concentrated towards the South and East, but still, looking at the map, very little has been built on and that picture will not be changing any time soon despite the amount of new developments which are going up. No wonder there is so much planning for new developments in the area. Puts things in a new perspective for me at least.

SAWTRY HISTORY SOCIETY

The September meeting was another vibrant & exciting talk from Paddy Lambert of Oxford Archaeology East on the *Roman Curse Scrolls*.

Curse tablets or scrolls were tablets of lead on which ancient Romans wrote spells or requests to various deities to exact revenge for wrongs, often thefts of money, clothing or animals. They are usually found in baths or temples, mostly rolled up & thrown into the bath or nailed to a post. One was found in Leicester in 2006, unrolled it measured 8" x 3" and the text on it related to a theft of a cloak. Some have been found that contain love spells in which case they were placed in the home of the target.

Around 200 have been found in Britain, almost 100 in the thermal spring at Bath. Although Paddy has never found one, he has been given one which he had x-rayed, he seems pretty pleased with it!

In October, we were treated to *Women in the LDV & the Home Guard* by Ruth Kerse of Blasts From the Past Living History Group. Ruth took on the persona of a land army girl who eventually wound up in Sawtry. This young woman was called Phylis Waldron she was brought up in Southampton, 2 of her 3 brothers were in the services and she convinced her father that she should be involved with the war effort. After initial training in Wiltshire she was posted to farms in the south-west, we were regaled with numerous stories of escaping animals.

A local colonel was eventually coerced into letting herself and another girl join the Local Defense Volunteers, as she said they were ideally placed out in the fields to keep a watchful eye on the sky for German activity. When Winston Churchill changed their name to the Home Guard the women were trained alongside the men, although not in great numbers.

As usual there is no meeting December. The subject of the next meeting on 18 January is *All Saints Church* by Kevin Ruff SHS member.

The History Society meets on the third Thursday of the month in the WI Hall, Gidding Road, Sawtry at 7:30. Visitors always welcome, entrance is £2.00 by donation.

HOW DO YOU SPELL LOVE?

It's been said that love is spelled *t-i-m-e*. In other words, if you want someone to know you love them, you spend time with them. It's especially true of children, but also of adults. When you spend time with a person, you give something of yourself to them. And that is the greatest gift you have to give - yourself. There's no substitute for time; no amount of money spent on a gift will make it as good as time.

This is an echo of the truth that lies at the heart of the universe. The One who created all that is, seen and unseen, gives time to it, to us, because he can't help but do so, any more than a parent can help love their child. It was the most natural thing in the world for God to come to earth as the baby Jesus at Christmas because He wanted to show his love by giving himself.

That time spent amongst us changed everything. It split time for ever: we now measure events as BC or AD. But it changed things not just on a grand, universal scale, but on an intimate, personal scale. For the question it puts to us is, how do you respond when God comes to live amongst you, spends time with you? Few responses have been more beautifully expressed than that of the Victorian woman poet Christina Rossetti in the final words of her carol, 'In the bleak midwinter':

*What can I give Him, poor as I am?
If I were a shepherd, I would bring a lamb;
If I were a Wise Man, I would do my part;
Yet what I can I give Him: give my heart.*

Courting Disaster

A woman who mowed down and killed a cyclist near Wareham, Dorset, after becoming distracted by her children throwing popcorn has been jailed for five months. She was also caught, five months after the incident, driving whilst being unfit to drive through alcohol and drugs. She pleaded guilty to causing death by dangerous driving and driving while unfit through drugs.

A learner driver was over the drink-drive alcohol limit after eating too many liqueur chocolates. The 30-year-old was arrested after failing a breath test when police saw a badly parked car in Hereford.

A dangerous driver who killed a teenage motorist in a crash which split her car in half has been jailed for six years. The 25-year-old man was speeding at a minimum of 80mph when he crashed into the 18-year-old's car in Dudley in October 2016. She died instantly and he suffered minor injuries. He was also disqualified for 14 years.

A drink-driver who flipped his car at 103mph on the M27 in Portsmouth and killed his friend has been jailed. The 21-year-old admitted causing death by dangerous driving. He was jailed for four years and eight months and banned for five years.

A drink-driver claimed he was over the limit because he had eaten too much brandy-rich Christmas cherry cake. The 25-year-old said he ate it at a party and did not realise it would make him drunk, being caught at more than twice the limit in Burnley on Christmas Eve 2016. He admitted drink-driving and was fined £140, receiving a ban of 20 months.

QUESTIONS FOR THE GARDENER

How do I look after my Desert Cacti in winter?

Firstly know your plant species if possible, as many cacti require different habitats and therefore different cultural ranges etc especially the forest species which hate being too cold at any time. But in reality all desert cacti are arid plants and therefore hate being too cold & damp over the dormant period, ie between October & April.

Do not grow any desert cacti below 5c / 41f. The plants must be kept in a cool, dry, and sunny position preferably in a greenhouse/conservatory with a temp. c 10c-13c / 50f-55f, all desert cacti must be protected from frost and not watered doing this time unless they are kept in a very warm spot over the winter period say in a warm house.

In early April start watering the plants again but do so gently at first with soft tepid or clean rain water. Start to increase this once the cacti fill out again and once in full growth start feeding with a suitable cacti feed.

Once all danger of frost has passed, put them outside, placing them in a sunny sheltered aspect well out of the way as desert cacti have very sharp spines and therefore can be quite dangerous! Water & feed as you would any other plant through the summer months, preferably using clean rain water feed with suitable cacti food.

I bring my plants back in towards the end of September. Always inspect them for pests & diseases. Control vine weevils at all costs, especially if the plants are summered outdoors, as they are very susceptible to these nocturnal pests and their grubs so inspect all of your indoor growing pot plants on a regular basis.

It is the time of year when we're enjoying a tittle with friends, cooking up festive feasts for the family and entertaining loved ones. With all the fun to be had it is easy to be distracted when cooking in the kitchen.

50 per cent of all fires in the home start in the kitchen and more than half of those are as a result of distraction whilst cooking. We want to help ensure your festive cheer doesn't go up in smoke this Christmas by sharing our tips below for safe cooking over the festive season:

- Never leave cooking unattended
- Do not cook when tired
- Do not cook when under the influence of alcohol, drugs or medication that makes you drowsy
- Regularly clean the grill pan and oven. Built up fat can easily catch fire
- Never leave anything cooking if you leave the house
- Do not leave anything flammable on or near the hob – tea towels, oven gloves and even washing baskets can catch fire
- Take care when using microwaves. Fires can start when people put food in too long. Always read the instructions on the packet – never guess the time needed
- Oven chips or temperature control deep fat fryers are safer than using a chip pan. If you do use a chip pan, do not fill it more than one third with fat and turn the heat down if the oil starts smoking
- Fire can break out in household appliances so you should regularly maintain dishwashers, washing machines and driers and never leave them on if you go out or when you go to bed
- Have a working smoke alarm on each floor of your home. If it keeps going off when you are cooking it is probably in the wrong location or you may have the wrong type of smoke alarm
- Never take the batteries out of your smoke alarm.

If you do have a fire in the house, get out, stay out and dial 999.
